





Housing

Comments

- Have housing be income based. The jobs from income offered in Nashville do not at all equal the money it costs to live in Nashville.
- Create more ways to afford a single family home and/or apartments. Get resources to the citizens; most people don't know where to go for help.
- Provide safe homeless camps with showers and sanitation and social services to connect people with organizations and employers who can help them get back on their feet
- Restrictions on out of state developers buying up our houses and land, especially in historically Black communities
- Utilizing local government-owned land to foster affordable and economically diverse housing development.


- Having more community based programs that bring our youth and seniors together so that everyone better understands each other



Housing

Comments

- 100% support a rail system in Nashville, it's a big investment but will be totally worth it! Also encouraging biking through bikeshare services (such as Citibike in NYC, Divvy bike in Chicago) and pedestrian infrastructure needs vast improvement too.
- Stop looking at downtown only, you need regular commuters daily to support the cost. Focus on providing rail to your interstate commuters; that relieves road congestion.




