





## Housing

#### **Top-2 Goals For Housing**

Selection rate for the most and second most important goals among 5 goals

- Ensure we are building a variety of housing options in all our neighborhoods to reduce housing shortages and lower housing costs

  Make sure there is plenty of affordable housing in the communities of Nashville for people who keep the city going (musicians, artists, teachers, firefighters, police officers, etc.)
- Ensure low-cost housing options are equally available to people of all walks of life
- Ensure people can afford to stay in their homes and are not being forced out
- 25% Eliminate homelessness

#### **Top-2 Goals For Mobility**


Selection rate for the most and second most important goals among 4 goals

- Make it easier to get around Nashville—to and from downtown and from one place to another in the region (connecting different parts of the City and Downtown better)
  - Ensure everyone has good access to downtown and the important parts of the region—make transportation options equally accessible to all across Nashville/Davidson Co.
- 40% Make it easier to get around inside the neighborhoods and communities where people live
- 27% Improve transportation safety and reduce crashes and personal injuries

## Housing

#### **Comments**

- Restrict or eliminate short term rentals.
- Encouraging via policy, subsidizing through tax breaks, and mandating via zoning requirements the construction of efficient and affordable housing units could make an enormous impact in the affordability of housing in the city
- · Incentives for landlords to not raise rents
- Make community aware of development so they can be a part of the process early in the process.
- Rent caps
- Require developers to incorporate a certain percentage of low income or section 8 housing in all new developments.
- Tiny homes for the homeless :)
- Change zoning laws to allow for more multi unit (missing middle) housing. Quadplexes can be the same size as one large single family home, but they're illegal to build in many neighborhoods.
- Legalize infill housing and design appropriate small scale multifamily housing
- We've got to be sure creatives and community workers (teachers, cops, etc) can live close to where they work.

## Education

#### **Comments**

- Establish a pipeline from the graduates of Nashville
   Universities into MNPS teaching roles that allow them to
   stay in the city and afford to do so. This can be modeled
   after or in partnership with Teach for America
- We desperately need more pre-school options in this city.
   Offer more, free or inexpensive vocational training for those adults who didn't get it in school. Offer \*more, accessible, free\* classes on computer basics, making a budget, etc.
- Free after school, weekend, and summer programs.
- Do not put public funding into charter schools!!!!!! Accept federal funding. Teach practical skills like shop, cooking, home economics. Teach children how to communicate and reason. Teach them honest history and how to have debate and discussion.
- Pay teachers more
- Make neighborhood schools a priority so that children can attend schools where they live which encourages parental involvement
- I recently learned about the MNPS Grow Together initiative, which aims to provide guidance and support to families who have children ages birth to three. This is very exciting for our city. I'd love to see more of this.
- Reducing environmental barriers to schooling re: transportation. Investing in EL, students w disabilities, foster youth, youth impacted by justice system, homeless youth, and other populations

## Mobility

#### **Comments**

- Connect the greenways. Finish the 440 greenway loop.
   More crosstown bus routes connecting places like
   Donelson to Bellevue
- Above ground light rail system that circles downtown and connects to a larger system that connected the surrounding cities to downtown.
- Making each neighborhood more walkable. I live in the Belmont area where I can walk freely and safely. I work in Bordeaux and Dickerson Road, where the homeowners cannot walk safely.
- A light rail would do WONDERS for this city I lived in Colorado and it has been nothing but positive for Denver. Cuts WAYYYYY into traffic especially with concerts/sporting events and makes the transport from the airport so easy
- Consider making public transportation free or at least, bring back the free downtown routes. Also, look at doing less hub & spoke bus routes so people can use bus routes more efficiently.
- Local vs tourist parking rates to make the city more livable.
   More sidewalks.
- The simplest way to tackle this issue is to reduce the trips people take by car. Build dense housing and mixed use development on an existing connected street network and plan for places of interest being within distance for walking, biking, etc.
- Please build more protected bike lanes, like the ones in 12 South!

## One Change

#### **Comments**

- Introducing gentle density to neighborhoods allowing more people to walk to retail and services.
- I would emphasize urbanism and a social safety net. Public transit, increasing safe walkways and bike lanes, and robust services for unhoused people would dramatically improve Nashville.
- Less focus on tourists; limiting AirBnBs/ short term rentals in neighborhoods.
- Basic needs of our community members being met: housing, transportation, food security, common sense legislation, etc.
- more opportunities for community engagement--every neighborhood should have a community garden, for instance
- Public transit. Changing car culture by offering dynamic and attractive options
- More green spaces and parks

- More library funding and programs for early literacy.
