


Positives and Negatives in Nashville





Education Priorities

Ensure everyone has good access to downtown and the important parts of the region—make transportation options equally accessible to all across Nashville/Davidson Co.



Mobility Priorities

Housing

Comments

- Make it legal to place tiny home units in many areas and spaces in Nashville. This would help so many more people have a home.
- Stop prioritizing development. Revitalize what is already here. STOP SPRAWL!
- Provide housing that doesn't feel like prison. If you don't feel safe and as though you can live in a neighborhood with good schools and amenitiesthose things are not offered for you, then you do not feel a part of the larger community. This resentment can cause one to not participate in a healthy way and cause deteriorating conditions for individuals and communities.
- The growth has driven up the cost for long time Nashville residents. My children paid over 50% higher to build their house due to this issue. We have to slow the growth for housing, safety, community reasons.
- Discourage continued growth allowing demand to decrease and availability to increase.

Education

Comments

- Housing is a difficulty tied to student success. Neighborhoods need to be healthy and safe so kids can come to school ready to learn. Currently, many students do not feel their community cares for them or their families. Poor housing options in addition to poor school.
- The only way to strengthen schools is to first strengthen families. The schools can be the best in the world, but if the families are failing, the children will not succeed.
- Go back to neighborhood schools. Passing a school just to bus kids to another for racial makeup is absurd. It costs more money to bus. Kids could get more instructional time instead of being on a bus for an hour. It takes parents and kids from their neighborhood in which they should be invested. It takes a village to raise a kid...why are you taking the kid from the proverbial village?
- Increase teacher pay, reduce number of students per class.

Mobility

Comments

- Bring rail into town, either in Union Station or on the East Bank. Use Briley Parkway as a circuit for Park N Ride carpooling and as an Urban Growth Boundary.
- Data driven traffic light synchronization. Boston did thus and reduced congestion by 18%
- Improved lighting and sidewalks should help reduced the number of pedestrian fatalities.
- · Light rail and subway developments
- Rebuild downtown interstate loop.
- Stop Selling our city to large investment developers with tax incentives. Ultimately, this destroys local communities by increase in crime, property taxes and traffic.

One Change

Comments

Youth

Comments
