





Top-2 Goals For Housing

Selection rate for the most and second most important goals among 5 goals

- Ensure we are building a variety of housing options in all our neighborhoods to reduce housing shortages and lower housing costs
- Ensure people can afford to stay in their homes and are not being forced out
- Ensure low-cost housing options are equally available to people of all walks of life

 Make sure there is plenty of affordable housing in
- the communities of Nashville for people who keep the city going (musicians, artists, teachers, firefighters, police officers, etc.)
- 22% Eliminate homelessness

Education Priorities

Top-2 Goals For Mobility


Selection rate for the most and second most important goals among 4 goals

- Make it easier to get around Nashville—to and from downtown and from one place to another in the region (connecting different parts of the City and Downtown better)
- Ensure everyone has good access to downtown and the important parts of the region—make transportation options equally accessible to all across Nashville/Davidson Co.
- 38% Make it easier to get around inside the neighborhoods and communities where people live
- 25% Improve transportation safety and reduce crashes and personal injuries

Mobility Priorities

- 9.4 Improve and increase public transportation availability and options throughout the city (light rail, bus rapid transit, expanded bus service)
- 9.2 Reduce traffic congestion
- 8.6 Improve road maintenance and operations on existing roads

Housing

Comments

- We need to put a cap on the corporate rental market. Companies buying up homes to artificially raise rent is wreaking havoc on our city.
- Again, public transit to allow people who live in the more affordable outskirts of town the ability to commute in.
- Have programs that assist people to acquire housing base on their income not the market.
- No minimum lot size, less complicated zoning
- Create housing for homeless people where they can get the help and resources they need along with a pathway to employment.
- Encouraging developers to build denser housing that encourages community building (homes/condos facing green space and each other with parking on the edge of the property. Cohousing model.
- We currently have enough housing to house most, if not all homeless folks in Davidson County. Instead of building more, ask what would to take to get the homeless into those homes. It can't possibly be much more than what we are already spend to jail and bus the homeless to other parts of the state.
- 25-30% of new housing needs to be reserved for low income so it does not create impoverished neighborhoods all together.

Education

Comments

- Increase pay to MNPS Support Staff to be at LEAST livable wage!
- Work on ensuring that we have clean, healthy environments in all our public schools. Improve nutrition in school meals by using real food and quality ingredients. Eliminate the need for students to pay for their breakfasts and lunches. Improve the retention of our teachers by giving them better compensation, providing materials for their classrooms like loose-leaf paper, pencils, scissors, tissues, hand sanitizer, etc., and putting the focus back on quality learning instead of standardized test scores.
- Overhaul the student teaching aspect of teacher training. Today it is a roadblock to a teaching career, there are many roadblocks that hinder beginning teachers instead of helping them.
- Internship options and partnerships with local leaders to give students real world experience and insight while strengthening community role models.
- Strong childcare in the early years with activities that foster brain development.
- Don't sell out to charter and private schools.

Mobility

Comments

- Rail service from all surrounding counties with stops in Davidson county.
- · Do not implement toll roads.
- Rail system, more bus routes into neighborhoods running every 15 mins. More sidewalks in neighborhoods.
- We need 3 year, 10 year, & 20 year goals. 3 year Improve bus stops. More routes. More suburban & rural park & ride stations. 10 year - Express lanes for busses. Reduce downtown traffic by creating shuttle/trolley system. Possibly limit automobile access at certain times. 20 year - Elevated train lines & elevated bus lanes.
- Overhead bypass for interstate travel through the 3 interstate road so semi's can get across reducing accidents.
- Light rail or trams to connect neighborhoods, and greenways so that people can safely get to schools and grocery stores without owning a car.
- There are thousands, maybe tens of thousands who don't live anywhere near a bus or rail stop. I'm in Davidson County, but at least four miles in all directions to catch even a bus and I'm not sure it would take me where I need to go. We need to focus on downtown, but I believe we're ONLY focusing on downtown or east Nashville. That is wrong and isolating.
- Work with surrounding counties to improve the flow of commuters coming into Davidson county. Revisit park and ride programs Offer incentives, rider schedules and safe and secure parking places.



Ideal Neighborhood

Comments

- A place where you can walk to restaurants, small businesses, food services/grocery
- Communication. I run our neighborhood's FB page and keeping in contact with neighbors is incredibly helpful.
- Council representatives who get involved and make people feel heard.
- · Sidewalks and street lights
- Affordable housing. The average rent does not match the median income anymore.
- Vision. A plan for the neighborhood.

Big Ideas

Comments

- Buy in from the other nearby counties to create a true regional transit system
- Find ways to bring people together, regardless of their political POV.
- Having more community-based programs that bring our youth and seniors together so that everyone better understands each other
- Race relations open dialogue. Acceptance of all Nashvillians.
- Focus on the people living in Nashville, all of the people in all the areas of Nashville. We can welcome visitors without forgetting the people who live here and without making their lives worse.
- How will this data be used and not just sit on a shelf with Nashville's other plans and surveys?
- Invest in affordable living solutions for artists.
 The IT City status began on the backs of artists who thrived here during a time of affordable living, but the crowd that has come to enjoy the environment these artists created has become unsustainable
- Let's focus on areas that aren't downtown.
 There is so much more to Nashville &
 Davidson County than the tiny area that tourists congregate in.

Youth

Comments

- Free transit would most likely get kids to anywhere they're growing minds take them. Libraries and community spaces related are always a great spot to let their minds expand and create [...]
- County-wide FREE after-school programs that focus on learning (helping with homework, individual tutoring, etc. to eliminate childcare costs and increase student knowledge and understanding.
- Ensure school safety is a priority. Increase compensation for teachers.
- Look at starting Trade and Apprenticeship programs in the schools again. Have more career counselors and start early
- There should be third spaces (poetry spaces, parks, skateboarding, roller rinks, open fields, swimming pools, art spaces, ceramics, etc.) designed for young people that's diverse, creative, affordable, and accessible.
- When we do better with affordable housing you have more stable families that can focus beyond survival and invest in their communities. Improve the lives of parents and you will improve the lives of children.
- More entertainment options for kids, especially downtown. Having city government officials spend time in the school explaining what the government does for the city. Encourage police officers to engage with youth in a community setting & often.
