



# Housing

### **Top-2 Goals For Housing**

Selection rate for the most and second most important goals among 5 goals

- 54% Ensure we are building a variety of housing options in all our neighborhoods to reduce housing shortages and lower housing costs
- Make sure there is plenty of affordable housing in the communities of Nashville for people who keep the city going (musicians, artists, teachers, firefighters, police officers, etc.)
- 42% Ensure people can afford to stay in their homes and are not being forced out
- Ensure low-cost housing options are equally available to people of all walks of life
- 22% Eliminate homelessness

### **Affordability Priorities Importance**

## **Education Priorities Importance**

- 8.8 Focus on early childhood health and education—without a good start, chances for success go way down
- 8.7 Increase access to affordable, high-quality childcare and early childhood education
- 8.6 Increase school safety
- 8.4 Focus on modernizing our school facilities and materials—every child deserves a clean and up-to-date place to learn
- 8.3 Focus on failing schools to do whatever is needed to turn them around
- 8.2 Increase personalized student focus and support to teach kids in ways that best fit their individual needs

# **Mobility**

### **Top-2 Goals For Mobility**


Selection rate for the most and second most important goals among 4 goals

- 78%
- Make it easier to get around Nashville—to and from downtown and from one place to another in the region (connecting different parts of the City and Downtown better)
- 48%
- Ensure everyone has good access to downtown and the important parts of the region—make transportation options equally accessible to all across Nashville/Davidson Co.
- 42% Make it easier to get around inside the neighborhoods and communities where people live
- Improve transportation safety and reduce crashes and personal injuries

## **Mobility Priorities Importance**

Mean score on a scale of 1-Not at all important to 10- Extremely Important

- 9.2 Improve and increase public transportation availability and options throughout the city (light rail, bus rapid transit, expanded bus service)
  - Improve bicycle and pedestrian connectivity and
- 8.5 infrastructure across the city and in the surrounding communities (bikeable streets, sidewalks, greenway and trail networks, etc.)
- 3.3 Reduce traffic congestion
- 8.1 Improve road maintenance and operations on existing roads
- 7.2 Construct new street and highway improvements to better connect parts of the city
- 7.0 Promote flexible and remote work schedules to reduce the need and impact of commuting

# Housing

### **Comments**

- For all homes built in an area (such as 1, 2 or 3 zip codes), build low-cost apartment buildings that house the same number of people in those same areas/zip codes, no matter where the houses are built (meaning, higher-income areas, too).
- Build dense housing along transit corridors
- If you lived in Nashville for 15+ years you automatically get a \$200-\$500 subsidy off of your rent. We need to keep locals here.
- Perhaps community-based jobs that are work/live provide housing as a benefit of employment. Rent control, or some restrictions on how much landlords can increase rent year-by-year.
- Block out-of-town investors from buying up all of the houses and then increasing rent. In our current housing crisis when families are being displaced, I don't see why any large companies or investors should be allowed to own single-family homes.
- Build tiny home communities on city land that is vacant. Use these to allow families to get on their feet and eventually be able to buy their own home
- Either build subsidized housing for lower-middle income workers or require developers to include subsidized units in their developments for lowermiddle income workers.
- Limit AirBnBs!
- Special considerations (tax breaks, credits) for certain lower paid professions to help them live in or closer to the communities they work in/serve teachers, daycare workers, law enforcement, firefighters, restaurant workers, etc.

## Education

#### **Comments**

- Focus on funding public schools, not charter schools or voucher programs
- Ensure that early childhood education and preschool is available to all students and families regardless of income. Provide more resources and services for low-income families and the schools that serve them.
- I am not an expert in education but know that teachers and staff deserve a higher pay. Public schools are most important and I want to live next to families with children who recieve a good education regardless of income, social status, etc.
- Start early with early childhood learning opportunities; continue to offer and expand options for young adults to complete GED; and support access to skills training and/or jobs that include skills training via Career Centers. Continue to offer adult education.
- Rather than one one, huge school system trying to apply a one-size-fits-all approach to education, we need to break the school district into mini-districts. This would get decision-making closer to families, neighborhoods, etc.
- · School Choice!!
- There just has to be a vision of making public education something to be proud of in Davidson county and Nashville
   not something to settle for if you cannot afford private school

# **Mobility**

### **Comments**

- Dependable and frequent light rail that extends to neighborhoods within Davidson County and to surrounding counties. Give incentives for commuters to use rail.
- More frequent bus routes. More cross city routes.
- Light rail or a trolley connecting East
   Nashville/Germantown/North Nashville/Midtown/Airport
   would do so much to free up congestion from people
   visiting the city and allow residents to easily get around in
   the dense areas without a car.
- Bus only lanes, community engagement and education to help drivers become more educated on pedestrian and biker rights, more HAWK and ADA compliant crossings. A huge part of this problem is lack of community education, stigma around public transit, etc.
- Light rail ASAP
- We need more sidewalks...
- Our local car culture will need to see future mass transit options as 'cool', convenient, affordable and safe. Local, regional and state leaders need to get on board with a 20to 50-year vision of investment and move forward with commitment of resources.
- Light rail or street cars to connect all major neighborhoods to downtown
- We need to solve the traffic mess that is BNA currently. A
  light rail to the city center or area offsite with rideshare and
  pickup would be ideal. Since a large majority of passengers
  are going downtown a rail to the city center would help
  alleviate traffic.

- Safety for everyone. Police present, good lighting, parks / green spaces, etc.
- More murals, support our nonprofit arts organizations and arts ecosystem.

# One Change

### **Comments**

- Connect all the greenways and make sure every street in Davidson County has a sidewalk.
- More support and understanding from the state government about what makes Nashville such a great place to live instead of seeing it as "the enemy" that must be put in its place. Nashville's success is Tennessee's success!
- Seriously need to improve the public school system to make it attractive to those who can afford private schools. There are two systems currently - the haves and have-nots - private and public.

# Big Ideas

### Comments

- Be sure to include additional services for the elderly, 60+ population, as the percentage of this population increases, not just here, but throughout the U.S. This includes resources for healthy living/accessibility to basic needs.
- TRANSIT PLEASE, WE'RE BEGGING.
- Make sure that residents can benefit from the tourism and entertainment sector in our city, even if they can't pay the exorbitant prices that tourists do. I'm thinking resident discounts to any and all city-supported activities or venues.
- Why not become the center for the best public education model in the USA or world? Partner with colleges, foundations, high profile businesses (Amazon, Oracle) and government to envision and create the K-12 schools of the future?
- Nashville growing into a city that is more environmentally responsible. LOADS of recycling receptacles everywhere, more places to charge your electric vehicle, more protected bike lanes and completely connected greenway system.
- More mixed use zoning in neighborhoods.
   Allow small groceries, pharmacies, cafes, etc. mixed in with residential. Higher density.
